STATEMENT OF INTENTION OF CANDIDACY TIME LINES for 2008 Primaries and Conventions

Filing for State Senate, State House of Representatives, countywide and less than countywide offices takes place with the county of residence political party.

March 16 12:00 noon Filing opens for party primary and convention candidates. Candidates file proper forms including Statement of Intention of Candidacy with their county political party. 7-11-15, 7-11-210, 7-11-220.

March 30 12:00 noon Filing closes.

White copy of the Statement of Intention of Candidacy is kept by the County Executive Committee.

Gold copy is given to the candidate.

April 4 Yellow copy must be filed with State Executive Committee along with applicable filing fees.

April 9 12:00 noon Pink copy must be filed with your county election commission. State political party forwards a list of candidates to appropriate county election commission. List must show specifically how candidates' names should appear on ballots.

April 9 All filing fees and a copy of the list of candidates sent to the county election commissions must be filed with the State Election Commission.

Filing for U.S. Senate, U.S. House of Representatives, and solicitor takes place with the state political party.

March 16 12:00 noon Filing opens for party primary and convention candidates. Candidates file forms including Statement of Intention of Candidacy with their state political party. 7-11-15, 7-11-210, 7-11-220.

March 30 12:00 noon Filing closes.

White copy is kept by the state political party

Pink copy must be given to the candidate

Gold copy may be recycled

April 9 12:00 noon Yellow copy must be filed with the State Election Commission along with applicable filing fees.

April 9 12:00 noon State political party forwards a list of candidates to appropriate county election commission and State Election Commission. List must show specifically how candidates' names should appear on ballots.
